O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

As we continue our walk through the 40 days of Lent this month, we are in the midst of this great paradox: Lent holds together our human experience of sometimes walking through a parched desert while surrounded with the promise of streams of living water.

This is our life as people claimed by God in the promises of baptism.

We turn in most of Lent to the stories of Jesus in John's gospel. When we hear about sin in John's gospel, it is good to remember that frequently that sin is understood as the state of being separated or out of relationship with God, not a moral wrong-doing or failing.

The living waters of baptism show up in many forms in the Lenten readings. The image, sound, taste, and refreshing coolness of water are all the more powerful when held in contrast with the parched and dusty wilderness — experienced by people feeling spiritual thirst or a loss of direction, as well as the increasing concern in many parts of the world, including our American west, over the threat of actual lack of water because of lingering drought conditions.

We return, again and again, to the promises made with water that we will be renewed, refreshed and reborn in our life in Christ.

Blessings to you, dear church, in your thirst and in your rebirth in these 40 days of Lent.



Morning Prayer

We will be gathering at the church to pray Morning Prayer on weekdays during Lent at 8:30 a.m. We meet in the sanctuary, and are seated in the choir pews in the chancel. Because we typically pray for every member of the congregation by name during Lent at these services, we have created a simplified order of Morning Prayer for you to pray at home every day during this season. Wednesday Evening Prayer and Thursday Lenten study

We will gather for Evening Prayer on Wednesdays at 6:15 p.m. in the sanctuary. At this quiet, midweek, traditional vespers service, our prayers rise as incense as we enter the quiet of the night.

Rambam's Ladder

Way back in the 12th century, rabbi and philosopher Moses Maimonides wrote a 93-page tutorial on how people should treat the poor. The Jewish tradition of tzedakah was looked upon as a manner of turning wrongs into rights and that helping the poor was "not simply a good act, but rather what God expects." He communicated his philosophy of giving in eight steps which became known as Rambam's Ladder (his initials in Hebrew were <u>Rabbi Moses ben Maimon</u>). Paraphrasing author Julie Salamon and knowing something about ladders from my previous career, it's probably best to start at the bottom rung and climb up, and so we shall:

- TO GIVE BITTERLY- when one gives but does so reluctantly and with much complaint
- TO GIVE LESS THAN IS PROPER, BUT TO DO SO WITH A SMILE- when you give less than is appropriate but do so cheerfully
- TO GIVE DURING A SOLICITATION- when you give simply because someone asked
- TO GIVE WITHOUT BEING ASKED- when you recognize a need and give without solicitation
- TO GIVE TO SOMEONE IN NEED, ALLOWING THEM TO KNOW IT WAS YOU WHO GAVE-Sages would wrap coins in sheets and put them over their shoulders while walking among those in need. The coins would fall out allowing shameless acceptance of the offering.
- TO GIVE TO SOMEONE YOU KNOW BUT THEY DON'T KNOW THAT IT WAS YOU WHO GAVE- Rabbinic sages would toss coins into the doorways of people in need and be gone before the recipient could see them.
- **TO GIVE ANONYMOUSLY TO ANONYMOUS RECIPIENTS-** in Maimonides' mind this was fulfilling the spirit of tzedakah for its own sake but there is still a top rung:
- TO MAKE A LARGE ENOUGH GIFT OR LOAN, OR EVEN BETTER, FIND HIM A JOB SO THAT HE WILL NEVER HAVE TO BEG AGAIN- "And you will give strength to the resident alien, so he may live among you." (Leviticus 25:35)

A ladder to gauge our giving, who knew? Well, besides a 12th century rabbi/philosopher, you!

The Jack M. and Marjorie H. Dershimer Scholarship Fund

Available to active members of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church enrolled or going to be enrolled as Thiel College students.

The William and Adelaide Horner Higher Education Endowed Scholarship

Available to active members of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church enrolled or going to be enrolled in any accredited Lutheran College or any accredited college in W. PA.

Welcome To Our Interim Organist

We welcome Steve Repasky to the organ bench at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. He'll serve as our interim organist after the retirement of Maidene Hackett, who had served us for 20 years.

Steve is originally from Youngstown Ohio, and earned a degree in organ performance from Youngstown State University, before moving to San Francisco, California, where he lived for 40 years. While there, he earned a Master's degree in library science from the University of California-Berkeley. He is a former reference librarian at UC Berkeley.

He served a number of congregations in California in those years. The last position he held was as organist and director of music at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in San Francisco.

He also was a founder and is a partner in the organ-building company, Hupalo & Repasky Pipe Organs, LLC.

He said when it was time to retire, his family made the choice to return to the Youngstown area because of the high cost of living in California. He bought a prairie-style house that is on what was his old newspaper route that he had as a teenager.

Since his return to the area, he has been working with the music department at YSU. He has also been called upon to play the organ at Thiel College for events there. He is helping us to make some connections with musicians in both the Youngstown area and at Thiel.

Steve has committed to being with us through Pentecost while the church council works on a job description and begins searching for a permanent musician to serve us.

Steve will play for all of our liturgies except for our Saturday evening service. Andy Joos has been playing for those and will continue at least for a little bit longer.

Please welcome both Steve and Andy, who are bringing stability to our worship life as we consider how to fill the music position permanently.


Your donation may be made in celebration of, in memory of, or in honor of a person (s) or an event. (Amounts given are not listed in the bulletin.)
