See Jesus, your king, in this holy week

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We enter April in the thick of Holy Week, and while I'd like to be able to shout out to you that Christ is risen, we are not there yet.

Of course, we really are there, and we know that because every Sunday, even in the season of Lent, we might say or sing, "Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again."

Christ will come again. It is this for which we wait, that Christ return and inaugurate the final coming of God's reign. Yet we can see signs in this Holy Week of God's reign having already broken into our world.

We see it on Thursday night, on the night when Jesus put on the apron of a servant and knelt down and washed the feet of his disciples. We see clearly Jesus as king, not with a sword coming to smite down the enemy with strength, but to serve others and offer bread — my body, given for you — and wine — my blood, shed for you.

We see it on Friday, Good Friday, when Jesus promises the criminal that he will see him in paradise, a promise from the cross for the criminal, and for us.

And then, finally, after three days of death and grief, the stone is rolled away and the promise of the resurrection is made real in Jesus, risen from the grave so that we, too, may rise.

Dear people of God, we enter these dark days with the burden of sin close by, but come Sunday, we will join our song of Alleluia with all of God's people for all times and the times to come, knowing that Jesus has defeated death, for us.

Then meet Jesus, walking among us, washing feet and offering the bread of life.

Blessed Easter, dear church.

Join us during Holy Week as we walk through these events, remembering what Jesus experienced in his life, and remembering why he experienced these things.

- Palm Sunday liturgies: Saturday at 5:30 p.m. and Sunday at 9:30 a.m.
- Holy Monday: Vespers at 7 p.m., with the rite of healing.
- Holy Tuesday: Vespers at 7 p.m.
- Holy Wednesday: Vespers at 7 p.m.
- Maundy Thursday: Eucharist at 12:10 p.m. and 7 p.m., including prayer watch after the evening Maundy Thursday services concludes.
- Good Friday: Worship at 7 p.m.
- Holy Saturday: The Three Days end with the Easter Vigil, which begins at 7:30 p.m. Resurrection of our Lord: Join us Easter Sunday at 9:30 a.m.

WILL YOU JOIN US IN PRAYER?

We are beginning a new prayer ministry at Holy Trinity and invite you to participate.



This will be an e-mail ministry, meaning that if you sign up, you will receive an e-mail asking you to be in prayer for someone or something as the need arises.

This ministry will be coordinated by our office administrator, Catherine Richardson. You can call her to ask that an e-mail be sent to ask for prayers for someone or something. She will also be the person to add people who want to be among those praying to the e-mail list.

Catherine is also responsible for the prayer list that is in the bulletin every Sunday, but not everyone who receives prayers from this group will wind up on the Sunday list. It's OK if you ask for the person to be added to the Sunday list, but you can also ask for prayers for someone that you'd like to be more private and not on the public list.

From Our Directors of Parish Ministry

Are You a Philanthropist?

Let me save you some time answering the above question-of course you are a philanthropist. Anyone who gives of their time, talent, or treasure to help alleviate suffering in the world is a philanthropist and we all try to do that, right? So we are all philanthropists or as the Wizard of Oz said to the Tin Man, we are all "Good Deed Doers.". If you want to know what kind of Good Deed Doer you are, read on.

We have all heard the saying: "give a man a fish and he eats for a day, teach him to fish and he eats for a lifetime;" let's use that saying to understand the 5 traditions of philanthropy as suggested by Elizabeth Lynn and Susan Wisely.

RELIEF-

Relief philanthropy starts with compassion. We see someone hurting and we want to help alleviate the pain. In terms of our saying: someone is hungry, let's give him a fish and take that hunger away.

IMPROVEMENT-

Improvement philanthropy takes the next step to helping. Sort of climbing the next step on Rambam's Ladder if you read last month's Messenger. We want to help people in need make real progress to improving their situation and maximizing their potential. In other words, we teach them to fish!

REFORM-

Reform philanthropy moves toward solving social problems and providing justice for people struggling. It doesn't do any good to teach a person to fish if they aren't allowed access to the fishing pond, does it? Reform philanthropy helps provide equal access to the fishing hole.

ENGAGEMENT-

Engagement philanthropy encourages the Good Deed Doer to enlist the assistance of the person we want to help. Bringing them into the problem-solving equation. In our analogy, asking them if they even like fish before trying to teach them to fish and fighting to gain a spot on the bank. And finally-

REPAIR-

Repair philanthropy strives to bring about reconciliation for whatever caused the person we are trying to help's pain. Righting a past wrong, if you will. In our story repair philanthropy would involve giving the fishing pond back to the hungry person.

So, where do you fall on your personal philanthropy scale? Which tradition do you follow? Well, if you are like most people you glide back and forth between traditions depending on the situation and which category of giver you are. But we will save the giving conversation for next month.

Discipleship in a Democracy: Sorting out a Lutheran View

Debates about the appropriate relationship between religious organizations and the state (government or political authority) today range from those who object to or are even hostile to religious expression in the public realm, to Christian nationalists who idealize and advocate a fusion of certain understandings of Christianity with American civic life. What distinguishes the ELCA's particular stance in these debates? This year's keynote, by the Rev. Dr. Roger Willer, Director of Theological Ethics in the Office of Presiding Bishop, will give attention to the biblical, theological, and historical sources that undergird the cornerstone concept that this church shall: "work with civil authorities in areas of mutual endeavor, maintaining institutional separation of church and state in a relation of functional interaction." In this way we will sort out—distinguish—the ELCA approach compared to several other views and provide a refresher for Lutheran Day in the Capitol.


A Reminder: Let Us Know When Someone Is Hospitalized

If you or someone you know has been hospitalized, please let the church office or the pastor know.

Many people assume that nursing homes or hospitals alert the church when someone is being treated. Because of the laws surrounding privacy (known as HIPAA), organizations have been required for a number of years now to honor your privacy in releasing information. Even if we call a hospital and ask if someone is being treated, hospitals are not allowed to tell us.

When you share information with us, it allows us to offer pastoral care, deliver flowers from the Sunday altar, and visit and pray with people when they're not feeling well. Thank you for helping us in this ministry of the church.
